Camp #15 Now has a Working Furnace at Lafayette Church Thanks to Bob and the Brothers

Brother Bob Koenecke is known as a man who gets it done - and Brother Bob has once again done just that. Lafayette Church now has heat, thanks largely to Brother Bob. In early December, Brother Koenecke finished the installation work on the new furnace at the church. This was an on-and-off job over three months in which Brother Bob found a newer propane furnace to replace the church's obsolete fuel-oil furnace, then disassembled and hauled the old furnace to the junkyard. Then Bob arranged with his brother Tom Koenecke, also a camp member and manager of a local Farm Service outlet, to install a new propane tank in back of the church. Bob himself fitted a pipe from the tank to the furnace inside.

Finally, Bob bought and installed fittings to dovetail the new furnace with the propane tank set-up. A professional heating contractor wanted \$6,000 for all this – Bob did it for less than two hundred dollars. Thank you, Bob – those power company lineman skills come in handy.





New Mold for Heg Statue Taken

The restoration of the Col. Hans Christian Heg statue is moving forward and the new statue should be in place outside the state Capitol next summer.

A contractor took a mold in early December of the head of a duplicate statue of Heg that stands in Wind Lake, Wis. Bob Koenecke photographed the contractor as he layered a rubber substance around the head of the Wind Lake Heg statue.

That mold will be used to recast a bronze head of Heg to replace the one still missing from the Heg statue vandalized in Madison last June.

Some good is coming out of that mindless act – Col. Heg, killed at the battle of Chickamaugua, is getting national recognition as a Civil War hero and a leading abolitionist who died for his country.
