## Journey of a Sons of Union Veterans' Drummer Boy

Almost a decade ago, a young boy visited the Sons of Union Veterans booth at the Kenosha, Wisconsin Civil War Museum. There, seasoned brothers would start him on a journey that would take the little guy back to his own family roots in the War of the Rebellion and onward to the beginning of his own career in the military.

That boy, Camp #15's Max Frederick, my son, is now 18. Just graduated from high school, Max has enlisted in the U.S. Navy and ships out July 19<sup>th</sup> on a six-year commitment to study nuclear propulsion.

Drummer Boy to Become a Sailor At the 2012 Civil War Expo at the Civil War Museum in Kenosha, Brian McManus and Jeff Graf were the first to befriend Max, instantly becoming his mentors. "They were welcoming guys," Max remembers, "and had a lot of knowledge about a subject in which I had a growing interest – the Civil War. They were immediate role models."

Camp #1 in Milwaukee where he served as a drummer boy, marching in Memorial Day and Veterans Day parades, among other events. Camp #1's Steve Michaels informed Max that he had been accepted into the Sons, telling him, "From now on you will be called 'Brother."

The constant encouragement he received from the other brothers on anything to do with the SUVCW, and learning from other members what they knew are among his fondest memories as a junior member, Max says.

In 2015, Max became a charter lineal member of a new camp close to his home in Racine County – Camp #15, based in Wind Lake, Wis. There, Max began carrying flags and muskets in parades. One special memory for him is a moving ceremony in 2016 when the camp rededicated a statue of Abraham Lincoln in Burlington, Wis., that had been torn down by vandals. The camp marched to the site as large clusters of snowflakes fell gently on them.

In addition to brothers McManus, Graf, and Michaels, many other Camp 1 and Camp 15 members played roles in Max's development. Brothers Graf and Tom Mueller helped research his 4x great grandfather, Captain Patrick Bennett of the 19<sup>th</sup> Wisconsin Infantry Regiment, Company E, who was killed in action on Oct. 27, 1864, at Fair Oaks, Virginia.

Brothers Graf, Tom Brown, and Bob Koenecke put civil war weapons in his hands. John Gilless taught him about signaling. Dave Daley's Christmas parties, and camp picnics at Heg Park and Jeff Graf's house provided him memorable fellowship. Pat Kulas, Patrick Fallon, Dean Collins, Kent Peterson, and Jeff Lesar are other brothers who helped shape a junior member into a young man.

Max, who lives in Kansasville, Wis., graduated from Catholic Central High School in Burlington, Wis., on May 28th this year with high academic honors. He lettered in baseball and football and is most proud of his four years in the school's musical program. His breakout, comic role his freshman year was speaking and singing in Mandarin Chinese in the play "Thoroughly Modern Millie." That was a role that set him up for a *(continued next page)*

supporting role as Uncle Max Detweiler in "The Sound of Music," and the lead roles of Jack Kelly in "Newsies" and, this spring, Jesus in "Godspell."

Max also graduates this summer as a 12-year member of 4H. He earned civic trips to Madison, Wis., and Washington, D.C., and an American history tour of the eastern U.S. called "Spirit of America" – a trip where he caught the travel bug. "On the 4H "Spirit of America" trip I found that I learned more going out and seeing the places where history was made," Max says.

The opportunity to travel and to serve in a nuclear propulsion job were factors in his decision to join the U.S. Navy. "I chose the Navy because of its unique career opportunities," says Max. "The Navy is the only branch that has nuclear propulsion."

Max said his membership in the SUVCW also steered him toward the military. "In the Sons, I picked up on the call to service," he says, "and I wanted to be in a group of people that have the camaraderie I experienced in the Sons." In the Navy, Max plans to continue his membership in Camp #15 but will also seek out and get involved in a camp near wherever he is stationed.

Max ships out July 19<sup>th</sup>, grateful for his upbringing, so to speak, in the SUVCW, and with particular thanks for his Camp #15 brothers. "The original Camp #15 members are guys who really love the Sons, everything they were doing in it, and everyone who was doing it with them," Max says. "They really love the group."

"I liked talking to all of them and being around them," Max continued. "I want to thank them for sharing their enjoyment with me despite the difference in age demographic. They have full lives, I was just starting mine. They made it easy to be part of the camp."

Marie Frederick lives in Kansasville, Wis., where she and her husband raised four children. Marie was Max's official driver and photographer through the years and still enjoys accompanying him to SUVCW events even though Max can drive himself now.

**Brother Bob Koenecke Finds a "Lost Grave"** Fifteen years ago, Brother Bob Koenecke discovered a lost grave while walking the Bloomfield Pioneer Cemetery near Pell Lake, Wis. Brother Bob noticed an empty space along a line of tombstones and a slight depression in the ground in that space. Using a probe he always carries, Brother Bob found a grave marker under the ground, buried three inches beneath the soil.

Chiseled into the stone marker was an American flag – Brother Bob knew immediately this was a soldier. Indeed, it was – and now thanks to Brother Bob and Brother Jerry Coveney, a VA tombstone is now on order for Private Darius T. Allen, who died in 1864 during the Civil War. Allen, a farmer in the Town of Bloomfield, served in Co. C of the 22<sup>nd</sup> Wisconsin Infantry. He left behind a wife and three children. RIP, Private.
